Même si Devangi Patel, 33 ans, travaille en tant qu'anesthésiste dans un grand centre médical à côté d'Atlanta depuis seulement deux ans, son but est d'arriver à quitter son emploi à 50 ans.

Le docteur Patel n'est pas la seule à la recherche d'une future indépendance financière - et à un âge relativement précoce. Il semble que l'écart générationnel est bel et bien activé : beaucoup de travailleurs de la génération Y n'aspirent pas à aller à la retraite vers 65 ans - ou plus, comme leurs parents. A la place, beaucoup de ceux qui ont une carrière professionnelle cherchent à quitter leur travail autour de la cinquantaine et à travailler de manière indépendante ou à travailler pour moins d'argent, ce qui serait plus sur la même longueur ^{d'onde} que leurs aspirations.

Cependant, alors que ~~certain~~ beaucoup de travailleurs de la génération Y souhaitent être indépendants financièrement autour de la cinquantaine, c'est dur à obtenir ; cela va demander d'épargner 50 à 60 pourcents de leur salaire dans le meilleur cas. La génération Y, qui représente ceux qui sont nés entre 1981 et 1996, sont entrés dans le monde du travail

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pendant la Grande Récession et rament dans un monde où les traditionnels chemins qui mènent à la prospérité, comme posséder une maison, ne peuvent pas être empruntés pour une ^{plus} grande partie d'entre eux ~~plutôt~~ que ceux de la génération d'avant.

Leur comportement est aussi en train de se construire, par incertitude en partie : ils ~~sont des spectateurs~~ ^{assistent à} d'importants changements économiques au même moment où ils s'efforcent de s'entretenir eux-mêmes.

ESSAI Should Charles III modernise the British monarchy?

The rest of the world has long looked on in bewilderment at the obstinacy of Queen Elizabeth II to remain that long at the head of the Commonwealth but her demise also sparked waves of sadness. Whereas she took an increasingly backseat role in political affairs, will Charles III stick to his pledge and be less vocal on current issues? I personally find that he needs to base his reign on reshaping the outdated monarchy and be the embodiment of the jump in the modern bandwagon.

Indeed, his mother left him a poisoned gift. She stood the test of the time and was an icon for most of British people but now that she passed away, ever more Britons want the monarchy over - more than 66% according to a study carried out in late 2022. I thoroughly feel that he would be better off revamping the British monarchy if he aspires to remain king. Unfortunately, this fairytale system is not in keeping with the times.

Above all, overhauling the British monarchy is about reestablishing its legitimacy. What with Prince Andrew's lies about the Epstein scandal and the Queen paying his bill, "Megxit" and the revelations of a member of the Royal Family being racist in the interview with Oprah Winfrey, Dianogate, and the Queen approving Boris Johnson's decision to prorogue Parliament, all is not easy for the Windsors. British people do not believe in the system especially for what happened through the times.

But all is not doom and gloom: the Queen already managed to restore their image. Were Britons not to have read the Do you know who Princess Alice is, no one would have known that taxes of the population were received by unknown members of the Royal Family. Therefore, the Queen streamlined the Civil list and she never adopted a significant role in politics.

However, I believe that monarchy needs to find his new path, needs to ^{emphasize} more than a symbolic role or nothing but everyone needs to be useful. Monarchy is a legacy that is not to be sniffed at and Charles III's environmental beliefs may be a good start.
